I.B. Learning Aims & Goals

- appreciate human and environmental commonalities and diversity
- understand the interactions and interdependence of individuals, societies and the environment
- understand how both environmental and human systems operate and evolve
- develop inquiry skills that lead towards conceptual understandings of the relationships between individuals, societies and the environments in which they live

I.B. Learning Objectives

IB learning objectives are determined across four objective criterion:

- Objective A: Knowing and Understanding
- Objective B: Investigating
- Objective C: Communicating
- Objective D: Thinking Critically

I.B. Grading Criteria

Students will receive a local grade which is percentage based and letter referenced.

Additionally, all IB objective criterion will be formally assessed twice throughout the year. These will be informally assessed on a continual basis. The success in the objective criterion is measured on a 0-8 scale. Limited competency is graded 1-2, adequate 3-4, substantial 5-6 and excellent 7-8. A cumulative score is calculated for the year using the criterion scores and this is referenced on a scale of 1-7.
